UPDATE FROM MEXICO

UPDATE FROM TURKEY

In Turkey, our Scholars attend Bogazici University in Istanbul. Turkey now has 11 current Scholars and 12 graduated Scholars. This fall, Megan, Jerry and John Fangman will travel to Istanbul to select the newest Scholars and to meet with the current Scholars. At Bogazici, all the courses are taught in English, but many of the students coming from public schools have had little or no exposure to English before arriving at school. Therefore, their first year is called English prep year. All year they study reading, writing and listening to English. At the end of the year they take an exam before beginning their studies at the University. This exam is very difficult and it is hard to know which students will pass. In recent years, we have selected Scholars during their English prep year. However this fall we will only select Scholars who have already passed the English exam due to disappointing failing test results.
