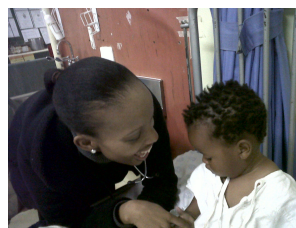
Ömer feels that being a Gallagher Scholar is helping to make his dreams come true.

Our September visit to South Africa was a magical experience for Ellen and me. It was the first time in six years that her health allowed her to make the trip. A highlight was the Scholar dinner where in addition to our current Scholars, we were honored to have 19 of our graduated Scholars attend. This clearly demonstrates that the South African Scholar Community is alive and well. Please refer to the South African section of this newsletter for more information.

We just completed a Presidential election here in the United States. The final result was clear, but close. There were a significant number of undecided voters before the four televised debates. I consider this a healthy sign. Democracy works best when people are open minded and listen to what the candidates are saying.

A requirement that we have for each country in our scholarship program is a legal code that bans discrimination. South Africa, Mexico and Turkey have such laws. Each of us needs to push back when someone is taking away the rights of others, particularly when the people being hurt are a minority and relatively weak in terms of political or military power.

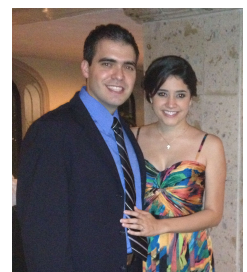
